Literacy Foundations in Grades K-3 Curriculum

Literacy Foundations in Grades 4-12 Curriculum

Key components of grades 4–12 curriculum (word study, fluency, vocabulary, comprehension, and writing); student motivation.

Types of literacy instruction and the importance of explicit instruction, among other techniques, to support students who are struggling in literacy.

Meeting the Literacy Needs of All Learners

The literacy needs of students with disabilities and English language learners.
