Latest News from the Director



Dear Colleagues:

As the REL Mid-Atlantic at Mathematica Policy Research moves into its second year, I'm excited to share news with our stakeholders in Delaware, the District of Columbia, Maryland, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania on our progress and activities to date.

After relaunching the REL Mid-Atlantic in April and listening to stakeholders discuss needs in the region, we focused on building partnerships with leaders in state education agencies; in rural, suburban, and urban schools and districts; and in regional nonprofits. Stakeholders from all of these organizations are active partners in our seven research alliances—on accountability, educator training and support, school improvement, personalized learning, career readiness, early childhood, and family engagement—and are working with REL staff on applied research, training, coaching, and technical support to address high-priority topics. Our Governing Board steers the ship, providing strategic guidance and input on project plans.

By working together on applied research, training, coaching, and technical support, we are creating actionable knowledge to tackle the region's pressing challenges—and developing stakeholders' capacity to interpret, conduct, and use research to support data-driven decision making. We are also disseminating knowledge from our own work and the larger education field to educators around the region. You can read more about these activities in the rest of the newsletter.

An important part of our work involves continually listening to needs and gathering input from many sources around the Mid-Atlantic region. Let us hear from you about your work and ways the REL might be able to help.

Fast Forward to Our New Video Series!



We've launched the first video in a series about the REL Mid-Atlantic and its work. The REL Mid-Atlantic: Building Capacity to Use Research in Decision Making features staff and Governing Board members discussing our main activities and our mission to collaborate with stakeholders on using evidence to address their pressing education problems. The video focuses on how the REL is guided by collaborative partnerships that are committed to growing capacity

and knowledge, and grounded in rigorous research. Stay tuned for upcoming videos on work in progress with the research alliances.

Updates from the Alliances



- **Personalized learning**. Many school districts are interested in implementing blended learning but do not have evidence on its effects or information on how to implement it. We developed <u>an infographic</u> about the research on blended learning, focusing on its impact on student achievement and best practices for successfully implementing it.
- Readiness for career entry and success. The career readiness alliance sponsored a workshop on the skills that

students need for long-term career success, particularly in the rapidly growing energy and health care sectors in western Pennsylvania. Participants included school district teams and local higher education staff; the alliance expects industry representatives to participate in follow-up activities. <u>View a recording</u> of the workshop.

- **School support and improvement.** The team is developing a district-based needs-assessment for supporting school turnaround in Delaware.
- Training and supporting excellent educators. The School District of Philadelphia began
 its teacher residency program in 2016–2017 to attract candidates from diverse backgrounds,
 improve teacher retention, and improve outcomes for students. We developed <u>a fact sheet</u> to
 summarize characteristics of existing teacher residency programs and related research. We are
 also developing an intake form for the district to use to learn more about characteristics of newly
 hired teachers and training programs to aid in recruiting and retaining new teachers.
- Accountability. Like other states across the country, Maryland is including additional measures
 of school performance, including a measure of school climate, in its ESSA plan. The REL team
 is working with the Maryland State Department of Education to select and refine climate surveys
 for school staff and students.
