If you're currently using a needs assessment survey to identify your school's or district's strengths and challenges for students in general, where can you integrate questions that will help identify the unique needs of your American Indian students? Or if you're considering how to monitor your Johnson-O'Malley or Title VI funding, how do you know whether your programs are making a difference?

**REL Central's Guide to Conducting a Needs Assessment for American Indian Students** is designed to help you conduct or adapt a needs assessment survey to better understand the strengths, challenges, and needs of schools serving American Indian students. Through the process of developing and analyzing the survey, you can also better understand the context and pressing issues for American Indian communities. The guide includes survey questions for teachers and administrators.

### WHY USE THE QUESTIONS IN THIS GUIDE

The questions in this guide are ready to use, technically sound, and culturally appropriate. They cover a range of topics relevant to the needs of American Indian students and can be adapted with the community to fit different contexts.

The needs assessment process will help you:



**Honor and respect** the community by creating opportunities to have conversations.



**Engage** a range of teachers and administrators in understanding American Indian student needs.



Confirm your thinking, or uncover new information, about American Indian student needs.



**Take action to refine existing efforts** or develop new strategies to meet American Indian student needs.




Identify and celebrate the bright spots in your school or district.

# **Culturally responsive instruction**

The degree to which classroom practices are inclusive of American Indian perspectives.



## State-specific American Indian instruction

The inclusion of focused American Indian content (for example, Native wisdom and history) specified in statewide initiatives.



### School climate

The degree to which a school's culture builds a sense of community, respect, and inclusion.



### **Equity**

How schools promote equitable access to materials, resources, and instruction and provide a positive learning environment to all students.



### Student attendance

The degree to which schools identify and remediate barriers to student attendance.



### Bullying

How schools work to promote a safe learning environment.



### Addressing social-emotional well-being

The degree to which schools employ practices to support students' social-emotional health.



### **Professional development**

The identification and implementation of professional learning opportunities for educators serving American Indian students.



### Teacher recruitment and retention (administrator survey only)

The degree to which schools serving American Indian students are implementing educator recruitment initiatives.
