Latest News from the Director



Dear Colleagues:

This spring, REL Mid-Atlantic staff have been busy collaborating with state and local stakeholders all over the region. Here are some of our latest activities:

- Working with the Delaware Department of Education to support school turnaround efforts
- Helping the Maryland State Department of Education as it creates school climate surveys for use statewide
- Assisting the School District of Philadelphia in acquiring better data on new teachers
- Planning a study of home visiting programs in the District of Columbia Public Schools
- Welcoming New Jersey's new Commissioner of Education and learning more about high priority needs in the state

These are only a few examples of REL Mid-Atlantic projects across the region that are promoting the use of research and data in educational decision making. There are more under way and even more in the pipeline to start over the next year.

Below you can read about two data conferences REL Mid-Atlantic has supported: Philadelphia's Research, Policy, and Practice (R2P) conference, which hosted close to 200 participants on May 21, and the Maryland Connections Summit, coming up this week in Towson, Maryland. We're delighted to be supporting efforts like these to disseminate research findings and allow educators and policymakers to learn from one another as well as from national experts. At the Maryland Connections Summit, I'll talk about ways to make sure that we are driven by data rather than drowning in data. I'm also looking forward to participating in a convening hosted by the Pittsburgh Personalized Learning Network at the end of June. I hope I'll have a chance to meet many of you in Towson or Pittsburgh!

Even if you can't make it to one of our meetings, there are many other ways to follow our work. The RElevant blog has ramped up with several new posts, on issues such as chronic absenteeism and programs that support home visits by teachers. We also have a growing library of short videos, including one described below on our work with the School District of Philadelphia to better understand the characteristics of its novice teachers.

Preventing Dropout in Secondary Schools: Recommendations from a Recent WWC Practice Guide

In addition to reviewing the recommendations, the fact sheet offers a quick overview of the guide. The complete WWC practice guide, released in September 2017, offers school educators and administrators four evidence-based recommendations for reducing dropout rates in middle and high schools and improving high school graduation rates. Each recommendation provides specific, actionable strategies; examples of how to implement the recommended practices in schools; advice on how to overcome potential obstacles; and a description of the supporting evidence.
