# What are some examples of guidance for school reopening?\*

As districts prepare for possible school reopening in the Fall, several states, agencies, and organizations are providing guidance or organizing reopening task forces.

#### How are states and territories in the REL Northeast & Islands region preparing for school reopening?

Many states or territories have convened task forces to address school reopening or have released preliminary guidance.

State or territory	Task force or guidance	Stakeholders involved	Dissemination process
Connecticut	Gov. Lamont convened the Reopen Connecticut Advisory Groups, which includes an Education Committee and is discussing criteria and guidelines for schools. The Advisory Group will consult with the Lamont Administration and legislative leadership on reopening. The Education Committee will make recommendations, but districts will be able to make adjustments.	The Education Committee includes representatives from higher education, teachers' unions, and private schools, as well as the Commissioners of Education and the Office of Early Childhood.	There is a <u>Reopen</u> <u>Connecticut</u> page on the CT.gov website with links to guidance. Gov. Lamont also conducts news briefings with updates on COVID-19.
Maine	As described in the <u>Maine Department of</u> <u>Education (DOE) Pending Guidance for</u> <u>Decision Making</u> , the DOE has convened a cadre of 20 school nurses to work with DOE School Nurse Consultant Emily Poland to develop scientifically-based, school-specific guidelines, which will then be reviewed by partner state agencies and shared with the education community. The guidance topics are prioritized in the following order:	School nurses, partner state agencies, Mills Administration	Guidelines will be "shared swiftly with the education community" (from 5/4/20 priority notice from Maine DOE)

### Guidance from other states and countries

- <u>SREB K-12 Education Recovery Task Force</u> "The SREB K-12 Education Recovery Task Force is convening leaders from 16 states to collaborate on strategies for reopening public schools....The group will seek solutions to prepare for a possible COVID-19 resurgence and future emergencies and tackle other key issues, including:
  - Students' academic growth and any possible learning loss
  - Equity and opportunity for students during and after the crisis
  - Using federal stimulus funds effectively and managing state budget priorities
  - Access to broadband and use of technology"

# Guidance from federal and international agencies

• <u>Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Reopening Guidance</u> (see page 45 for guidance related to schools) (May 2020)

"This guidance is meant to supplement the decision tools [see below] CDC released on May 14, 2020. It lists specific practices that employers may find helpful at particular stages of the COVID-19 outbreak. This guidance sets forth a menu of safety measures, from which establishments may choose those that make sense for them in the context of their operations and local community, as well as state and local regulations and directives.... CDC is releasing this interim guidance, laid out in a series of three steps, to inform a gradual scale up of operations. The scope and nature of community mitigation suggested decreases from Step 1 to Step 3. Some amount of community mitigation is necessary across all steps until a vaccine or therapeutic drug becomes widely available."

• <u>CDC School Reopening Decision Tree</u> (May, 2020)

"The purpose of this tool is to assist administrators in making (re)opening decisions regarding K-12 schools during the COVID-19 pandemic. It is important to check with state and local health officials and other partners to determine the most appropriate actions while adjusting to meet the unique needs and circumstances of the local community."

• <u>World Health Organization Key Messages and Actions for COVID-19 Prevention and Control in Schools</u> (March 2020) "The purpose of this document is to provide clear and actionable guidance for safe operations through the prevention, early detection, and control of COVID-19 in schools and other educational facilities. The guidance, while specific to countries that have already confirmed the transmission of COVID-19, is still relevant in all other contexts. Education can encourage students to become advocates for disease prevention and control at home, in school, and in their community by talking to others about how to prevent the spread of viruses. Maintaining safe school operations or reopening schools after a closure requires many considerations but, if done well, can promote public health."

• <u>An Initial Guide to Leveraging the Power of SEL as you Prepare to Reopen and Renew Your School</u> <u>Community</u>

The Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning (CASEL)

"In this guide, CASEL shares a framework with actionable recommendations to help school leadership teams plan for the SEL needs of all students and adults during the upcoming transition into summer and the beginning of the new school year. While this guidance is written for school leadership teams, states and districts will play critical roles in ensuring schools have the resources, support, and guidance needed to carry out these actions....CASEL is also working with many collaborators to produce comprehensive guidance, scheduled for release in late June, with additional recommendations, resources, and tools to help school leaders support and sustain SEL throughout and beyond the pandemic."

• <u>Return to School Roadmap: An Opportunity Labs Initiative</u> *Opportunity Labs* 

A roadmap of essential actions to help district and school leaders plan and implement a safe, efficient, and equitable return to school. Includes sections organized by topic area (governance, wellness, instruction, postsecondary, facilities, school operations, and technology) addressing actions to "do first," "do before school opens," and to do "when schools are open and operating." The roadmap is meant to be a companion to traditional school opening procedures and public health agency guidance.

• <u>American Enterprise Institute Blueprint for Back to School</u> *American Enterprise Institute* 

"Together with a task force of accomplished educational leaders—including former state chiefs, superintendents, federal education officials, and charter network leaders—this report sketches a framework that can help state policymakers, education and community leaders, and federal officials plan appropriately for reopening. As communities and public officials start to think about the problems ahead, states, districts, and schools should consider at least six different buckets of work: school operations, whole child supports, school personnel, academics, distance learning, and other general considerations."

• <u>A Plan to Safely Reopen America's Schools and Communities</u> *American Federation of Teachers* 

"This document provides a roadmap for navigating the next steps. It provides specific guidance for transitioning from lockdowns to other public health tools to limit the transmission of COVID-19. It focuses on reopening school buildings in particular....We expect the plan to evolve and adapt over time."

- School-based public health interventions
- School-based public health reorganization
- PPE and sanitization
- Mental health supports for students
- High quality instruction
