IDEA: Improving Postsecondary Outcomes for Youth With Disabilities

IDEA Sec. 300.43(a)(1):

- (a) Transition services means a coordinated set of activities for a child with a disability that—
 - (1) Is designed to be within a results-oriented process, that is focused on improving the academic and functional achievement of the child with a disability to facilitate the child's movement from school to post-school activities, including **postsecondary education**, vocational education, integrated employment (including supported employment), continuing and adult education, adult services, **independent living**, or **community participation**;
