### Overview

### Why are we doing this project?

Conduct focus groups to better understand districts' and schools' challenges and successes with the Biliteracy-Bilingualism Seal.

We use results to improve guidance and support for districts and schools.

Districts and schools use the guidance and support to increase numbers of students who pursue and earn the Seal.

Students who pursue and earn the Seal have better motivation, language and academic proficiency, and college and career opportunities.

#### **Steps**

- 1. **Define** what we want to learn and why.
- 2. Determine participants.
- 3. Create protocols.
- 4. Recruit participants.
- 5. Conduct focus group sessions.
- 6. Analyze data.
- 7. Communicate findings to key stakeholders.
- 8. Use the findings to achieve project goals.

### Steps: Progress so far

- 1. **Define** what we want to learn and why.
  - <u>Understanding</u> (or misperceptions) of requirements and pathways.
  - Motivation for adopting/promoting the Seal, or not.
  - Promote and recruit: Communications, who signs up, at what grade, recognitions, barriers/successes.
  - Implementation: Requirements, student support, needed resources, adding new languages, barriers/successes.

### Steps: Progress so far

#### 2. Determine participants.

- Districts who have adopted the Seal.
  - District leaders.
  - Counselors and teachers.
  - Grade 12 students.
- Districts who have not adopted the Seal.
  - District leaders.
- Tribal or district leaders in districts who have adopted the tribal language pathway.

### **Steps: Progress so far**

- 3. Create protocols.
  - Initial drafts of questions for your review.



## Focus group questions and protocol

#### Prepare a moderator guide



A moderator protocol/guide includes an introductory script and lists questions to ask the group.

### Focus group questions

Question type	Purpose
Opening	Helps participants get acquainted and feel connected
Transition	Moves smoothly into key questions
Key	Obtains insight into areas of central concern to the study
Ending	Helps researchers determine where to place emphasis and brings closure to the discussion
