

Improving math and literacy

learning is of national concern following the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) 2022 results for grades 4 and 8 students. REL Appalachia developed the <u>NAEP</u> <u>fact sheet</u> to help partners understand the national and regional picture and connect to resources to support learners across the region.



Many districts are using instructional coaching as a lever to improve K–12 math achievement. REL Appalachia staff and partners from Kentucky delivered a <u>presentation</u> on assessing the quality of math coaching conversations at the National Council of Supervisors of Mathematics (NCSM) conference in October. The session included an introduction to the Coaching Conversation Observation Rubric that the Kentucky Department of Education and REL Appalachia codeveloped.



A key factor in improving academic outcomes for all students is engaging families in their learning, including families with non-parent primary caregivers. Access <u>materials from a</u> <u>recent REL Appalachia community</u> <u>of practice meeting</u> to learn about the importance of including grandfamilies and kinship caregivers and strategies for engaging them in the school community. 
