School readiness refers to the extent to which a child is prepared to engage in and benefit from classroom instruction and other educational experiences in elementary school. It encompasses a range of skills and abilities, including cognitive, language, social-emotional, and physical development.

School readiness is important for student achievement because it has been shown that children who are well-prepared for school are more likely to succeed academically and socially.¹ Children with a solid foundation in various skills and knowledge gained during these early years are able to engage in learning and interact effectively with teachers and peers in school.

Research suggests that school readiness is associated with a variety of factors, including home environment, early childhood education experiences, access to healthcare, and family income.² By promoting school readiness, parents and educators can help ensure that children are prepared to succeed in school and beyond.


