Lunch and learn: Supporting Indigenous English learner students

To kick off the U.S. Department of Education's National Native American Heritage Month activities, REL Southwest hosted a virtual lunch and learn for Department staff on October 31. The event discussed our work promoting native language preservation and culturally responsive education practices for supporting Indigenous students while highlighting a two-part mini-documentary, Walking in Both Worlds: Native American Students and Language Acquisition. The mini-documentary centers on educators from Cuba and Jemez, New Mexico, and describes strategies they are using to preserve native languages and support English language development.

working with New Mexico educators to develop, implement, refine, and test Write to Succeed, a professional learning program aimed at improving English proficiency among English learner students and literacy skills for all students. The Evidence-Based Writing <u>Practices to Support English Learner Students</u> infographic explains the research that informs the Write to Succeed approach, which weaves together a scaffolded writing approach with culturally and linguistically responsive instruction.
